your ideas! Telephone 01535 633503. 4. Vandalism. These last three months have seen damage to the newly renovated Park shelters. Toughened glass window panes have been broken and knives taken to the beautifully repainted woodwork. "Gaz" now has his name for all the world to see!

The newly erected Parish Notice Board at the entrance to Manse Way was pushed over but it is hoped that a stronger means of support has now been found. The timetable frame at the stone bus shelter against the Park on Main Street was smashed open and on one evening the very substantial wooden bench was levered off the wall ,smashed and thrown over the Park railings. This bench is greatly appreciated by travellers, particularly elderly ones, during this wintry season and it has been reinstalled. Five new signs were erected at the entrances to the Park but were abused during the first two days. Hopefully by raising them and adding extra protection this essential investment will not prove to have been wasted.

With the help of some voluntary work it is hoped that £250 will be sufficient to correct these matters.

5. The Parish Council has been assured by North Yorkshire County Council that the legal work associated with the

construction of a bus shelter outside the Village Hall has now been completed and that we can confidently look out for the arrival of workmen. Hopefully the next edition of the Village Newsletter will be able to report success. Maybe even a celebratory photograph.

 Protection from the elements at the bus stop opposite the Black Bull is clearly inadequate and it is hoped to erect a shelter in the next financial year.
The younger members of the village will

be pleased to learn that new cradle swings have now been installed in the Park. 8. The Parish Council was represented in recent discussions initiated by our County Councillor concerning the need for a bridge over the railway in order to relieve the congestion at Kildwick level crossing. As we all know this is an on-going problem with any solution inevitably requiring a great deal of money. 9. Drainage work will soon be commencing in the Clough. As strollers will have noted, rainwater from the surrounding fields has been running across the path due to blockage in the natural drainage system. This makes the

path muddy and could be particularly dangerous in winter. Sutton village is very fortunate in owning properties such as the Clough, Crag Nook Delph and the Pinnacle but of course they do represent a substantial financial responsibility which has to be met out of

the Council Tax. **10.** If you have any comments or

Proposed Development of Greenroyd Mill

At the beginning of November the village was notified by Craven District Council that a planning application had been submitted for the creation of 69 apartments in the mill and the construction of 31 houses in the mill grounds. At the time of going to press the plans for the application were available and the Parish Council was in the process of learning more details and organising a meeting so that residents of the village could meet with planning officers and learn more of the proposed development. The introduction of such a substantial number of new residents into the village, with the associated infrastructure and traffic demands, inevitably raises many questions and hopefully these will be answered in the weeks leading up to the proposals being considered and decided upon by the District Council Planning Committee. It is understood that if the proposals are passed the Church of England Junior School is to benefit in that it will receive desperately needed playground and recreational land plus an area for car parking.

Local Venues No.8 **Parish Hall and** Dancing

When built it was known as the Parish Hall, later St Thomas's Hall, now it is the Sutton-in-Craven Village Hall, run by a committee of villagers and employing a caretaker. Used for many functions, on hire for receptions, wedding anniversaries, parties, and used by many villagers and organisations.

It was built app 1925, the foundation stone laid at a ceremony by Mr James Bairstow Esq. J.P. of the local mill T & M Bairstow. The mill is now demolished and is a housing estate.

Situated on Main Street, many events were held to raise money by villagers. This was matched £ for £ by Mr Bairstow. It stands in lawned grounds, ornamental berry bearing trees have been planted in recent years.

Dancing at "TOMMY HALL" has been and is a popular pastime. Band names, which were once well known, were the Savona; Ken Henderson; Craven Players; Del Rio. Advertisements for these events were in local newspapers and shops, giving day, date, time, cost, the band and master of ceremonies. Saturday nights 8.00 to 11.45. Fridays were Balls continuing to 1.00am. Tickets could be purchased from shops, members of the event organisers or at he ticket office to the left of the vestibule.

Dances would be modern, old time, 50.50 or fancy dress. A corner of the ticket would be clipped off on entering the hall. The ladies and gents cloakrooms had an attendant who issued a raffle type ticket and a straight pin to pin half the ticket on the coats, the other half kept to be handed in for your coat on leaving. Outdoor shoes were left on the floor in a brown carrier bag and exchanged for dancing shoes.

Often chilly in the hall, seats near radiators were soon in use. For Balls, attractive small folding programmes with a pencil attached had spaces for partners to reserve a dance.

Wearing a dark suit, the M.C. had white gloves, a flower in his buttonhole and, if it was a posh "do", tails and also a pussy bow. When a dance was announced he led his partner to the floor and round the room. Then they each invited another person, so the floor began to fill. Each dance was played three times, with from four to perhaps eighteen players, a crooner, singer an cornet and saxophone solos.

Waltzes, Foxtrots, Tangos, Quicksteps, Veleta, Doris Waltz, Barn Dance, Eva Threestep, Lancers, Polka, Polyglide, St Bernards, Military Two Step, Pride of Erin, Lambeth Walk, Hoky Koky - and with the Conga, the line was often led outside, round to the side or emergency exit and back onto the floor.

In the "Charleston" era girls wore fringed slant hemmed dresses, lots of beads and hair bands (they were before my time).
