Notes:

- The 1891 census shows the Hackston family, minus 4 year old Isabel, living at number 28, Back Roman Rd, Broughton. Whereas the 1901 census shows the Hackston family now living seven doors away at number 14, Back Roman Rd, Broughton.
- 4 year old Isabel Elizabeth Hackston was staying with her Grandmother Isabel Clough at 57, Victoria St, Sutton-in-Craven on the night of the census (5th April 1891). Isabel Clough was 65 years of age, widowed and living with her 4 single daughters; Jane 37 yrs, Grace 28 yrs, Edith 25 yrs and Mary 20yrs.
- Sarah is shown as being born in **Bradford** on the 1891 census, **Glusburn** on the 1901 census and then **Sutton-in-Craven** on the 1911 census!
- Her twin sons Thomas & William are shown as being born in **Bradford** on the 1891 census and then **Sutton-in-Craven** on the 1901 census.


It had been **99 years** since Britain was last involved in a major European conflict following the defeat of Napoleon at the Battle of Waterloo in 1815

Britain declares war on Germany

In the autumn of 1914, the young men of the nation came from town and village to take the King's shilling and to offer him their dedicated services in defence of their homeland. From mills and mines, from shops and farms, from office chairs and civic departments, from loom, lathe, bench, plough and counter they flooded into the recruiting centres in answer to their nation's call for young manhood. These new recruits came to be known as 'Kitchener's Volunteers'

Prior to enlistment, Thomas Hackston worked in the designing office at T. & M. Bairstow's Mill, Sutton-in-Craven as a Designer in worsted coatings.

At the outbreak of the Great War, Thomas Hackston together with his twin brother William responded to the call and volunteered to enlist into the 1/6th battalion Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment) in October 1914.

They were given consecutive regimental numbers, 2708 for Thomas and 2709 for William and they both commenced with the rank of Private.

A couple of years later they were each issued with a second regimental number, once again consecutive, 265701 for Thomas and 265702 for William.

The West Riding Regiment raised 24 battalions during WW1 including the 1/6th (Territorial Force) battalion at Skipton on the 4th August 1914.



At the beginning of June 1915, Thomas and his fiancée Miss Elsie Dickinson were married at St Thomas's Church, Sutton-in-Craven, less than 4 weeks before he and his brother William entered the theatre of war in France.

The wedding was reported in the Craven Herald newspaper on 11th June 1915 as follows:

SUTTON - 'Khaki' Wedding

At St. Thomas Church on Saturday afternoon a 'khaki' wedding was solemnized by the Rev. A. Armstrong, curate-in-charge. The parties were Pte. Thomas Hackston, of the 6th Duke of Wellington's Regiment, now stationed at Thoresby Park and twin son of Mrs. Hackston, Gordon Street, Sutton-in-Craven, and Miss Elsie Dickinson, only daughter of Mrs. Dickinson, of Springfield Lodge, Sutton-in-Craven. The bride was attended by Miss Isabel Hackston, sister of the bridegroom, and Miss Ethel Summerskill, niece of the bride, and was given away by her brother, Mr. Thomas P. Dickinson. In the absence of Private Wm. Hackston, twin brother, who is also serving in the same regiment, Mr. Edward J. Parker, cousin of the bridegroom, acted as 'best man.'

The Western Front

The Western Front was the name applied to the fighting zone in France & Flanders, where the British, French, Belgian and later American armies faced that of Germany.

It was marked by a system of trenches and fortifications separated by an area known as 'No Man's land'. These fortifications stretched 475 miles and precipitated a style of fighting known as trench warfare.

From the moment the German army moved into Luxemburg on the 2nd August 1914 to the Armistice on the 11th November 1918, the fighting on the Western Front in France & Flanders never stopped.

Just as there were quiet periods, there were also the most intense, savage, huge-scale battles the world has ever known.

Thomas and his twin brother William served their King and Country side by side. They were together the whole time their battalion was in France, except for a short period when Thomas was hospitalised in England suffering from gas poisoning.

After almost 3 years on the battlefields of France & Flanders, Pte Thomas Hackston was **Killed in Action** on the 30th April 1918. He was killed instantaneously when an artillery shell landed in his trench

SUTTON-IN-CRAVEN - Tribute to Private T. Hackston

Captain T. Coulthurst, in a letter to Mrs. Tom Hackston, of Springfield Lodge, Sutton, says:- "I think you will have heard the very sad news and know by now that your husband has laid down his life for his country. I know this is a very terrible blow to you, and I am

indeed sorry for you. Please accept my deepest sympathy. Your husband was killed instantaneously; a shell burst in the trench where he was, and a large piece passed right through his body. We all mourn his death; he was always such a splendid soldier, and a great favourite with all his comrades. It is hard for us to lose such splendid men when we need them so badly."

A memorial service to Private Hackston was held in St. Thomas's Church, Sutton, on Sunday evening, when the vicar (Rev. A. R. Light) made a very moving and sympathetic reference to his loss and mentioned that he had been closely associated with the work at St. Thomas' Church and Sunday School.

TYNE COT MEMORIAL

The Tyne Cot Memorial is one of four memorials to the missing in Belgian Flanders. It bears the names of 34,935 officers and men, including Pte Thomas Hackston, whose graves are not known.

It is now the largest Commonwealth war cemetery in the world in terms of burials. At the suggestion of King George V, who visited the cemetery in 1922, the Cross of Sacrifice was placed on the original large pill-box. There are three other pill-boxes in the cemetery.

The cemetery was designed by Sir Herbert Baker.

Pte Thomas Hackston is also remembered on the Sutton-in-Craven war memorial, the Eastburn memorial and on the tomb-stone bearing the name of his parents and sister in the burial ground of St Thomas' Church.



Thomas Hackston's twin brother William survived the remaining 5 months of WW1 and was discharged from the army on the 10th February 1919.

4 months later in June 1919, William together with his sister, mother and Thomas's widow Elsie, presented a red chalice veil and burse to St Thomas' Church in memory of Thomas Hackston

The widow of Pte. Thomas Hackston, along with his mother, sister and brother (Mr. W. Hackston) are presenting to St. Thomas's Church Sutton, a red chalice veil and burse which is being worked by the Warham Guild (London), in memory of Pte. Hackston. In thanking the donors, the Vicar (Rev. A. R. Light) in the 'Parish Record' says it is touchingly appropriate that the red veil and burse, which will be used on all festivals for martyrs, as well as at Whitsuntide, is in memory of one who laid down his life that others might live.
